



Bible Worker To Plant Hobart City Church

E ugene Estil has been working this year with Pr Daniel Matteo and the New Norfolk church to prepare their community for our Easter camp meeting in New Norfolk next year. Through his work two people will have been baptised, and a small group of some 17-20 non-members (including Muslims and non-Christians) now regularly meets in his home. Eugene and his wife Michelle, a nurse, simply invite people into their home, where they eat Michelle's lovely cooking, have a short devotional, and play board games together. "The members of the group have now asked if we can study the Bible together. It's what we have been waiting for," said Eugene. He is also studying the Bible with some of them in their homes. Imagine what would happen if all over Tasmania we opened our homes like this. we need the Holy Spirit's guidance. Then He will lead us to people in the park, grocery store or anywhere else. If we have not started to ask Him to use us to bring others to Him, why not start right now."

Eugene, who studied for the ministry in the Philippines, will be an intern minister next year in the Hobart region. He will work with the New Norfolk church, and be part of the year-long "Ablaze 2019" evangelistic thrust to reach Hobart for Christ. This includes planting a new church in Hobart City next year under his leadership.

Six Priorities For Successful Mission

Sometimes the church seems to be like a World War II war ship that twists and turns in all directions in an attempt to escape an aerial bombardment. But the bombardment the church twists and turns from is a seemingly endless barrage of ideas and methods to achieve its mission. Interestingly the New Testament church and its leaders didn't have that problem, because they focused on the same six things that Jesus spent his time in ministry doing:

- Jesus maintained a Spirit-filled life through consistent quality time spent with His Father in prayer, the word, and loving obedience (Matt 4:4,6,7; Mk 1:35; Luke 3:21,22; 4:1,14; 6:12; John 14:31; 15:9,10). Our conference recently witnessed in the ministry of Brenda Walsh of 3ABN Kids Time, that a Spirit-filled life results in successful mission for God.
- Jesus was part of a small group of twelve disciples – in fact by his second day on the job He had gathered five of His small group, and this before any healing, preaching or teaching

on His part (John 1:35-51). It was in the context of His small group that He ministered for over three years. Does your church have a small group ministry? What about your Sabbath School classes? Do they meet the needs of members? If few come to Sabbath School compared to the worship service, there is a reason and it must be addressed.

- Jesus, filled with the Spirit, went around doing good, especially through healing and health ministry (Acts 10:38). Does your church have an active ongoing helping ministry - especially a health ministry? How can your youth be involved in ADRA and health ministry?
- Jesus preached or proclaimed the gospel both publicly and one on one (Mk 1:14,15; Matt 4:23; John 3:1-21; 4:7-26). Has your church planned anything in this space for members to invite their friends to in 2019?
- Jesus taught publicly and house to house (Matt 9:35). Are the children's and youth Sabbath Schools seeking

to bring them to Jesus and into commitment to Him through baptism? Are our school teachers seeking to win children to Jesus, or just share the 3R's. Is your church working with your school to bring souls to Jesus?

 Jesus trained his followers by having them observe Him, sending them to have a go themselves and then debriefing with them (Mk 3:14; 6:12,13,30,31; Matt 10:5; 11:1). Does your church have plans for 2019 to train for various ministries inside and outside the church? Are the youth included in those training events?

As church leaders and pastors we should ask, no, must ask, does our church have a place for these six things consistently, or do we operate in a hit and miss fashion, where we neglect some and overemphasize others? On reading the book of Acts, one notices that the New Testament church grew mightily because, under the Spirit's leading, it prioritized all six factors.

Making Those Steps Count



Walking 20 steps across a room can help others believe life is worth living

The message of 10,000 steps for your health's sake has been one of the most successful health messages of this decade. Armed with pedometers, people have faithfully beaten the pavement to reach that magic number. Well, it might surprise you that the number 10,000 was chosen in the 1960's, in Japan, simply because it was a round number. The good news is that there is no doubt taking 10,000 steps is better for your health than nothing. However, the bad news is that researchers have found that 15,000 steps is the optimal number for your health's sake – just when we thought we had got it right. So with the steps we take between sunrise and sunset the different things we walk to and walk for – reflect our priorities and values. So how do you use your steps?

When we are at church, we will often see our friends engaged in what can be described as 'close-knit circles of conversational comfort', which we will gladly walk 20 purposeful steps across the Church to chat and catch up with our friends. But what if someone was standing alone? Would we have the courage to walk those 20 steps back across the room to talk to that person?

Imagine for a moment what it is like for someone to come for the first time to one of our churches – what do they see? What questions are running through their mind? Here are a few to start with:

- · Can I make friends in this church?
- · Is there a place where I can fit in?
- Does the church want me?
- · Will the Sermon and church be boring?
- Are my kids going to be safe?
- · Am I dressed right?
- Are they going to do anything weird?
- How does the church and the facilities present itself? Does the church look unkempt, and shabby?

Now using our sanctified imagination, our first-time visitor has observed a number of 'close-knit circles of conversational comfort', and now they are awkwardly standing alone. With some of those questions above circulating in their mind – how are those questions being answered? How many times have we heard where someone who comes to church for the first time remembered despondently how no one talked to them? It is only 20 steps.

Recasting the story, what if a person engaged in this 'close-knit circle of conversational comfort' saw this person alone and took the courageous 20 steps across the room to talk to them. After introducing themselves, they ask their name, where they are from, and when they are curious about what they do, the conversation usually takes care of itself and with this simple interaction, this can make all the difference to their perceptions of the church.

I recall a 15 year old sitting alone during the church service and one of the older members left her husband to walk 20 steps to sit with her. That 15 year old was almost in tears that someone would actually take an interest in her. She recounted the story for weeks. That walk made a difference. It is surprising how something small

can make such a difference.

Remember when the prodigal son was on his journey home after

squandering his Father's inheritance, the Bible says 'he came to himself' (Lk15:17). This means 'he thought to himself', so in other words he was going to solve the predicament of hunger and the humiliating loss of his Father's inheritance himself. The biggest challenge facing the prodigal son prior to meeting his Father was the Kazazah ceremony which cuts off those who lose their inheritance from their families and the villagers. But he was hungry, and now he continues in hope but is unsure of the outcome. His Father sees his son afar, also aware of the Kazazah ceremony and now concerned for the safety of His son, makes the courageous, but culturally insensitive run past the villagers to reconcile with his son, This demonstrated to the villagers reconciliation had occurred, thereby nullifying the Kazazah ceremony. It is at the time of the embrace between the Father and Son that grace is experienced.

Reconciliation took a courageous, and self-deprecating walk – or in this case a run – through the village to save his son. Jesus walked the talk and also took the agonizing and humiliating walk to the Cross to save us and humanity for eternity. A walk across the room hardly compares, but let us all look out for those standing alone and make that critical walk across the room to talk, share and make friends. It can make a big difference for eternity.

"Our culture values the size of the gift, but God values the size of what we keep."



With our Health program being approved and partly funded by the South Pacific Division, there is a buzz about mission, evangelism and health initiatives all around the conference. From community gardens to cooking classes, from Breakfasts to fitness classes, from Depression Recovery to CHEP, CHIP and other health seminars, churches have the opportunity to apply for special funds from the Conference. This can be done by completing the Health Fund Application Form available through the local pastors.

In addition to this, local churches may apply to the Conference for evangelism grants that can be used for outreach endeavours such as Bible seminars, Prophetic series or Public Evangelism Campaigns.

Stewardship is not only about receiving tithe and offerings. It is also



about making sure our church buildings are representative. This is why we have welcomed and also helped financially Collinsvale Church and New Norfolk Church with their renovation projects this year.

And when it comes to investments, God has also been helping us secure good properties in Launceston and Hobart that are strategically located with strong income revenue and capital gain.

I can only thank you for your faithfulness and praise God for His blessings. I pray that we will become better stewards for Him and that all of us will hear one day the words: "Well done, good and faithful servant... Enter into the joy of your Lord."

Bible Worker Helps Transform The North West

asmania is being transformed thanks to the generosity of our members in collectively contributing \$90,000 for Bible Workers.

Candice Berghan worked tirelessly this year in the Devonport, Ulverstone and Sheffield region. She: had eight Bible study contacts, four of whom will be baptised next year; started the Second Bite food distribution program with nine families being helped between Sulphur Creek and Port Sorell - one man from this program is now having Bible studies; took over the Great Controversy door knocking initiative from Gary Romano, and led and trained others in this weekly work; door knocked and letterboxed in Sheffield and Penguin; was the Ulverstone Health Leader; conducted weekly nutrition classes for 50 people in a Devonport health food shop where she worked part-time; helped Robbie Berghan train members in how to give Bible studies; started the Ulverstone and Devonport Fast Discipleship program and trained others, who are now leading these programs; preached across the North West region on Sabbaths; ran Sabbath School classes; conducted Bible studies at North West Christian School; and was requested by the Bible Society to speak at their rallies in Wynyard, Launceston, and Devonport.

Unfortunately for Tasmania she has recently accepted an offer to

be the Head Clinician at a Health retreat in Victoria. Candice, you will be sadly missed on the North Coast, and we just thank you and praise God for the work you have accomplished in God's mission. Her work illustrates what Ellen White said: *There is no limit to the*

usefulness of one who, putting self aside, makes room for the working of the Holy Spirit upon his heart and lives a life wholly consecrated to God" (E G White, Maranatha p103).

Next year three more Bible Workers will be employed, one in the Launceston region and two in the North West region.

12 Sure Ways To Keep & Engage Youth In Mission

1. It Starts At Home

"God has given to all fathers and mothers the responsibility of bringing their children to Jesus, teaching them how to pray and believe in the word of God." – {AH 189.1}

2. Invest Good People and Resources into Sabbath Schools

"The Sabbath school affords to parents and children an opportunity for the study of God's Word...We should especially impress upon the minds of the youth the importance of seeking the full significance of the scripture under consideration." – {CG 511.3}

3. Start Small Groups

"Let little companies meet together to study the Scriptures. You will lose nothing by this, but will gain much." {PaM 274.1}

4. Pray Corporately for and with Young People

"In rescuing souls from (Satan's) devices, far more will be accomplished by Christlike, humble prayer than by many words without prayer." – {CM 81.1}

"The prayer meetings should be the most interesting gatherings that are held, but these are frequently poorly managed." – {CCh 292.1}

Reignite Afternoon Youth Services (AY's) and Include Times for Sharing Testimonies

"In the afternoon, at three o'clock, we assembled for social meeting." – {DG 243.3} "A short, interesting Bible reading will often be of greater benefit than a sermon. And this can be followed by a meeting for prayer and testimony." – {CCh 265.6}

"The social meetings should be managed with plans and devices to make them not only seasons of pleasantness, but positively attractive." – {CE 47.3}

6. Have Leaders with a Heart for Youth at both School & Church Work Together to Make Jesus Attractive in All Meetings

"...there should be warm hearts to take a lively interest in our youth...Sabbath meetings, may be, without constant care and unless vitalized by the Spirit of God, the most formal, dry, and bitter mixture, and, to the youth, the most burdensome and the least pleasant and attractive." {CE 47.3}

7. Get on Their Level

"Let those who are competent to teach youth, study themselves in the school of Christ, and learn lessons to communicate to youth...Let teachers so far unbend from their dignity as to be one with the children in their exercises and amusements, without leaving the impression that you are watching them, and without going round and round in stately dignity, as though you were like a uniformed soldier on guard over them." -{CE 48.1}

8. Give Young People an Opportunity to Serve

"The Lord is calling for the youth, for He would make them His helpers to do good service under His banner." – {AH 358.3}

9. Use Camp Meetings as an Opportunity to Give Young People Experience in Outreach

"By engaging in work at the camp-meeting, all may be learning how to work successfully in their home churches."{ChS 195.4}

10. Make Church a Place Where Young People are Trained

"Every church should be a training school for Christian workers. Its members should be taught how to give Bible readings (studies), how to conduct and teach Sabbath school classes, how best to help the poor and to care for the sick, how to work for the unconverted. There should be schools of health, cooking schools, and classes in various lines of Christian help work." {CME 18.1}

11. Give Them Encouragement and Love, Because Youth is a Vulnerable Time

"The youth need sympathy, affection, and love, else they will become discouraged. A spirit of "I care for nobody and nobody cares for me" takes possession of them."{CE 48.1}

12. Unleash the ARMY!

"With such an army of workers as our youth, rightly trained, might furnish, how soon the message of a crucified, risen, and sooncoming Saviour might be carried to the whole world!" {CSA 66.6}




Pr Daniel Matteo, our Conference Youth Director, led out in the Week of Worship program at Hilliard Christian School towards the end of
