



#### CREATE A MEMORY

Every year at Spring Beach Youth Camp we have the opportunity to welcome strangers into our camp facility. We show them hospitality and Christ's accepting, non-judgemental love. We have free Christian literature that they can read and take with them and a wide variety of Christian story books and videos for them to enjoy.



Over time we get to know the group leaders that come back year after year because they experience the power of camps and see the benefits that camps bring to the participants. They choose to come here because it is a beautiful, peaceful place, away from the cares of the world. It has a different feel about it. It is a place where, as a temporary community, people can grow and develop in their life's journey or pilgrimage.

We have the privilege of being a part of that experience. Influencing that experience in a Christian way to create a memory.

In 2023, up till February 26, over 370



guests have chosen Spring Beach Youth Camp. We have served over 468 scrumptious vegetarian meals and have run flying fox, the climbing wall and kayaking for several schools.

The week beginning the February 27 will be one of our biggest weeks ever. Approximately 240 children will be staying, working with five outdoor instructors every day of the week. Thirteen sessions of flying fox, 13 sessions of kayaking, 13 sessions of abseiling and 8 sessions of climbing wall, along with the group run activities we provide. Our kitchen will be serving 2880 vegetarian meals.

All these people, here at our Adventist Camp, enjoying healthy vegetarian meals in a natural bush setting, interacting with Christian staff, and doing activities that encourage character-building.

Over 600 souls this year that will have heard, maybe for the first time, about the Adventist Church and experienced some interaction with Adventist Christians and their lifestyle. We may not be able to preach to these people but in the words credited to Frances of Assisi "Preach the gospel at all times. Use words if necessary." Proclaiming the Gospel by example is better than actually proclaiming it with voice.

Challenging kids to experience a different way of living, to step outside their comfort zones and achieve goals is very rewarding. Time at Spring Beach Youth Camp does indeed create a memory and influence lives.

We are proud of our camp and the faithful witness it is to Christ in Tasmania. Please pray for our camp here, that soul's will continue to be touched and seeds that are planted may grow to be part of the harvest when Christ comes again.

# I WILL GO RIDE



t the end of January, 17 riders from most Australian states, the United States and Vietnam participated in a cycling journey of 1000 km to Cooranbong, New South Wales. Riding in two separate groups, the first departed from Melbourne heading north. The second group departed Brisbane heading south.

I was part of the Melbourne group and arrived at Avondale University on Tuesday afternoon, February 6.

The I Will Go Ride had a focus on pastoral well-being and personal faith sharing, combined into an endurance cycling adventure. It also aimed to encourage Adventists everywhere to be people of Hope - who say, "I Will Go! - I will respond to the call to take personal ownership for mission and share the love and message of Jesus with the people around me."

The ride was inspired by pioneer literature evangelists Phillip Reekie and his nephew Frederick, who rode bicycles to share literature in remote parts of Australia from the early 1890s. Their work was significant in establishing many Adventist churches in Australia. Adventist leaders in Australia say that Reekie influenced thousands of lives after delivering a copy of The Great Controversy to Thomas Kent, a widower from Eugowra in rural New South Wales. Kent shared the book with his neighbours and five other families, who also became disciples of Jesus. It is estimated that at least 20,000 people have discovered Jesus through the work of those pioneers.

It is my hope that this will encourage you to share your faith by giving away literature to people who are willing to accept it. Step up in faith and be amazed at what God can do through you!

## "SO MUCH WASTED TIME"

The American musical sitcom of the early 1970's, the Partridge Family, was popular in many countries including with Australian audiences thanks to its lovable characters and light-hearted fun. The fictitious show follows the escapades of a widowed mother raising five kids playing in numerous musical gigs travelling in a colourful bus. Their adventures conveyed a yearning sense of innocence that was so often missing on TV at the time. Their successful signature song, "I think I love you," even outsold the Beatles - now that is impressive. However, beneath the veneer of innocence, all that fame came at a cost - particularly to David

David Cassidy was propelled to world-wide fame during the 1970's with live concerts around the world. With large sponsor deals, he became the heart-throb for many teenagers. Yet by 1980 he was broke. Most of his life he battled chronic alcohol abuse. At 67, dying of organ failure with his estranged daughter Katie Cassidy by his side, he shared his last words – "So much wasted time." What a sad end to a life when he had so much offered by the world.

Babylon of old sought to assimilate the Jews into their polytheistic culture where the God of the Bible would be one amongst many. In a polytheistic world, it was difficult to remain loyal to God alone as the stories in the early chapters of Daniel illustrate. David Kinnaman et-al in their book "Digital Babylon," chillingly outlines similar objectives of Babylon to the snares of the internet and social media. Over-reaction you might say?

According to Kinnaman, on average 15-23 year olds consume 2657 hours per year – a full-time job is around 1872 hours per year. In anyone's book this is a staggering and a disturbing statistic. Still harmless? Kinnaman states the following:

Deep spiritual longings, which ought to be lovingly tended and skillfully cultivated, are choked to death by binge television, immersive gaming, and social media scrolling... But if we are not vigilant and intentional, digital Babylon glitzes and blitzes our days so completely that we never get around to pursuing the deeper things of life.

When the influence of 2657 hours on the internet is compared to the influence of the church and the Bible on life, it doesn't take Einstein to work out that the primary influencers on a congregation on any given Sabbath is not the Bible or the preacher – it is the social media and the internet. Satan is working hard to atomize the influence of God and the gospel on our lives. For many, our lives are too congested and the result for many is that the relationship with Jesus is merely tacked on.

With so much wasted time, here are some suggestions to balance our time on the Net:

- Limit the time on gaming, social media and the internet.
- Watch what we are watching.
- Listen to the self-talk used to justify your time.
- Be intentional by creating time with God away from technology – Read the Bible with a real Bible.

Social media ironically is supposed to help us connect more, but studies have shown that people with high usage feel more isolated, depressed and anxious. David Cassidy's last words are hauntingly tragic and should give pause for us to reflect on the priorities we set. The web of life can easily ensnare us to over-schedule, and that squeezes God out. In the Laodicean age we live, our biggest need is to learn to waste time with God.
