




ULVERSTONE BAPTISMS

Thank you to Sarah Scheermeijer and Sue Collins for orchestrating this great event that brings life and growth to the school and North West community.








Outdoor Education Camps and activities

The History of Collinsvale Church



recalled the story of a man who found himself lost in the wilderness. Weary and dehydrated, he stumbled upon an old water pump in the distance. With his last ounce of strength, he gripped the handle and began pumping vigorously, hoping for water to quench his thirst. Yet, to his dismay, no water emerged. Overwhelmed by despair, he sat down, fully aware of his dire thirst and exhaustion.

As he sat there, a weathered tin can caught his eye. Inside, he discovered a piece of paper bearing a crucial message. It revealed that the pump had a leather washer, which required moisture to function properly. Beneath a large board nearby, there was a cup of water - just enough to wet the washer. The note further explained that if he were to drink from the cup, it would not be sufficient to moisten the washer. However, if he poured all the water onto the washer, he would have an abundance of water at his disposal.

Now, if you were in the man's shoes, what would you do?

This story serves as a metaphor for our lives and the choices we make. The cup of water represents the limited resources and opportunities we possess. We can choose to consume it entirely to satisfy our immediate needs, but it will vanish without providing lasting fulfilment. Alternatively, we can utilise it to "operate the pump" - to invest our resources and efforts into something greater. By doing so, we not only experience the best that life has to offer but also open ourselves to the eternal life that Jesus offers us each day.

To operate the pump, one must exercise

faith - the faith to surrender our own desires to Jesus Christ and say, "God, may Your will be done in my life." The question then becomes: how strong is your faith? Are you willing to place your own will entirely in the hands of God, trusting in His wisdom and guidance?

Consider the cup of water as a symbol of the choices you make in life. Will you use it solely for personal satisfaction, or will you pour it out in faith and witness the abundance that comes from aligning your will with God's?

Don't worry about what people think about you. Think of what God can do for you. Trust His will. Hebrews 11:1 "Now faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen."

Originally known as Bismarck, Collinsvale underwent a name change



during World War I due to the prevailing anti-German sentiment in the community.

In February 1889, the Seventh-day Adventists arrived in Bismarck and began preaching in the local Wesleyan church. However, they were later denied access to the church. Undeterred, they held several meetings in the state school classroom, only to be turned away once again. It was then that August Darko and his wife generously opened their home to the Adventists. Regularly, a group of approximately 50 to 70 individuals gathered in their kitchen to listen to the preaching.

On July 20, 1889, the Bismarck Seventh-day Adventist church was officially established with 34 members. Construction of a church building began in August 1889, and on December 28, 1889, the first services were held in the newly built church. The following year, on January 1, 1890, the church witnessed its first wedding between Henry Fehlberg and Bertha Totenhofer. After 134 years, the church remains steadfast. It is the enduring faith of the members that until now this group of believers continued their fellowship. We want to inspire the members of Collinsvale Church to stay devoted to the Lord and continue illuminating their community. To the newly established Hobart Church Plant and Huonville Fellowship Group, keep persevering. Move forward with determination, raising the banner of Christ, and maintaining your faith, for the Lord has even greater plans in store for you.

The experience of the North West Men's Camp at the Guildford Lodge Waratah, was like the experience of the two men on the road to the village of Emmaus.
