



THE LORD IS MY SHEPHERD

Tasmanian society has a rich Christian history. Churches, even if now largely empty, still dot the landscape. Christian morals and ethics, although outwardly ignored, still underpin many of our laws and institutions.

Amid all the challenges that Christianity faces, there are still bible verses that the average Tasmanian can recognise. This includes verses like John 3:16 and Psalms like Psalm 23.

It is often during challenging times that people turn to a well-known Psalm looking for peace and comfort and I would like you to take a minute to read through the 23rd Psalm once again.

Psalms 23

- 1 The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want.
- 2 He maketh me to lie down in green pastures: He leadeth me beside the still waters.
- 3 He restoreth my soul: He leadeth me in the paths of righteousness for His name's sake.
- 4 Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil: for Thou art with me; Thy rod and Thy staff they comfort me.
- 5 Thou preparest a table before me in the presence of mine enemies: Thou anointest my head with oil; my cup runneth over.
- 6 Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life: and I will dwell in the house of the Lord for ever.

This Psalm was written by David the son of Jesse, one of the kings of Israel. Not only was he a poet and musician but also a great warrior and fighter, a skill set that rarely goes together. In his early years of life, he was a fulltime shepherd and would have lived for extended periods of time with the sheep. His sole responsibility would have been to care for the sheep day and night and make sure all their needs were filled.

While looking after the sheep I imagine that he had a lot of time to enjoy the nature by which he was surrounded but to also contemplate the creator Himself. This I believe is reflected in Psalm 23. Notice the wording in verse1.

"The Lord is <u>my</u> shepherd; <u>l</u> shall not want."

The underlined pronouns indicate to me that this is personal, this is something that David has experienced for himself. The Shepherd he is talking about here is a friend, someone who is known to him personally and we, the reader, get insights into that relationship through this Psalm. This personal relationship gives him peace that the Good Shepherd will provide for his needs today. The friendship also gives him the courage to face hard times and it gives him a hope for a better future to come.

Living like this is something I believe we can experience today as well. We may not spend our days looking after sheep, but we can still spend time contemplating the words and works of the Creator and as we do our lives will be changed. Regarding this idea, Ellen White wrote these inspired words.

"If the thoughts are right, then as a result the words will be right; the actions will be of that character to bring gladness and comfort and rest to souls."

For this reason, I want to encourage you to spend time with Jesus every day. Make this your priority and further to this I want to encourage you to lead others to do the same. Start right where you are in your home and with your family. True change in a society will only happen when individuals are changed. So, behold Jesus and that is what you will become (2 Corinthians 3:18).





PNG FOR CHRIST, NUWOK - MANUS ISLAND

t was an exciting experience being called to preach and teach in PNG this past April and May. From the very start, it was obvious it was going to be a spiritually charged event. We were welcomed like royalty, as there have been years of preparation that have gone into this program.

From the very first night, with over 700 spiritually hungry people attending the Nuwok church on Manus Island, people flocked to listen, be challenged, and inevitably respond to Christ's call on their lives.

The Church members and leaders had set up three outdoor sites around the Lorengau area, with a stage, screens and a prayer room at each site. There was one site in Nuwok, one in Lorengau town, and another just east of the town. Each site was packed out every night of the program, and decisions were made nightly at the sites.

It was clear the churches were excited to be involved, and happily assisted

the international speakers in any way possible. There was much prayer each night, and God kept the rain away for each of the sites and each of the programs, sometimes from just before and until just after the program had finished. His hand of grace was evident in this to everyone present.

There were opportunities to visit members, friends of members, and those making decisions, which was much appreciated by those visited. In Nuwok, I also took advantage of an opportunity to share worships with the children of the Adventist Primary School, and in return was mightily blessed by their singing and their appreciation of the visits.

Of course, the baptisms from decisions made was a major delight of the trip and it also strengthened my own faith. We baptised 205 people over two Sabbath's at the Nuwok site, and altogether there were well over 700 baptised across the seven sites on Manus Island.

With over 400,000 people baptised

across the length and breadth of PNG and over 150,000 yet to be baptised, I left Nuwok with a degree of sadness for leaving this spiritually hungry place. However, I was also joyful at having met some wonderful brothers and sisters in Christ, whom I could now call friends forever. Our site alone left over 70 yet to be baptised, which will in total, grow the Nuwok Church membership by 50 percent, with nearly 300 new members.

At the end of the program, it became clear to me that there would be a need to assist this region with a Fly and Build program, to allow them to house all the new members, or better assist their current ones. Please watch out for news on this, as we hopefully pull the plans together for 2025.

Please also pray with me, that our hearts here in Tasmania will be touched with generosity for our sister conference of the Madang Manus Mission, and they will be blessed by whatever we can offer, in both financial and practical assistance in the very near future.








HOBART REGIONAL

Pr Leo emphasised that it is vital we work together to invest in each other as there may be changes in generations, but the gospel remains the same. In the end, we are all family.


FAITH FM PROJECT

Bibles Needed in Madang, PNG

Having had the joy of presenting 'Revelation of Hope' at the Madang Teacher's College recently, I came back to Tasmania recognising that we are blessed in so many ways, but in different ways to our wantoks in Papua New Guinea. They have the major blessing of the Holy Spirit working within their people groups, and that is the biggest and best blessing that any Christian can experience. However, we do experience the Holy Spirit working here, but not to the same extent as they are currently experiencing.

We consider ourselves blessed by what the Lord provides for us; spiritual blessings as well as temporal blessings, as most of us have had employment over many years. However, that is not true of our northern neighbours. Most of our PNG brothers and sisters are subsistence farmers and they are faced with the reality that they live hand to mouth from week to week.

The majority of those recently baptised do not have the means to purchase a Bible that would help them to 'grow in grace and in the knowledge of Jesus Christ'. The 'World Changers Bible' costs them 10 Kina (a lot), which to us is about \$4, or less than a regular cup of hot chocolate.



Pastor Luke Frank, the District Director for the Madang township, tells me that they have a need for 1500 Bibles in Madang and a further 500 Bibles at Yamba Village, a close neighbouring village. The spread of the gospel is continuing within their wantok communities, with a further harvesting program planned for August, further exacerbating the need for Bibles.

How can we help our Brothers and Sisters?

Remember that for less than a hot drink, we can sponsor a Bible that will plant their feet on solid ground. The theme for the PNG FOR CHRIST program was "If it's in the Bible, I believe it: If its not in the Bible, it's not for me." Sound advice of eternal value!

If you use the 'eGiving' app to financially

support the work of the Lord, there has been a new category included which is called 'Madang Bibles'. A designated amount given will go specifically to our sister Conference/Mission for the purchase of Bibles, as will a tithe envelope put into the offering bag with a heading "Madang Bibles' written on the front. A visit in person to the Conference Office will also achieve the same purpose.

Whatever your situation, as we count our blessings, we come to recognise that 'God is good'! A sharing of some of our financial blessings will enable our wantoks in PNG to experience Jesus Christ in a fuller way by their personal reading of God's love letter to them.


"know the good stick well"
