SUPPORT FOR MADANG

Hi Friends,

How happy I am that you, as my Tasmanian family, made my dreams come true. What dreams am I talking about? Well, in the last TASDA, I appealed for money to purchase 2000 bibles for Madang after my visit there last April / May to present in the PNG for Christ program. The last update that I had from the Conference treasurer was that \$13,000 has been raised so far, with other donations still arriving. Fantastic!!! We have an undertaking from the South Pacific Division that they will cover the cost of the freight involved in getting them to their destination, so what a terrific outcome! Thank you! Thank you! Thank you!

That has been one goal achieved successfully, so I am seeking your help once again to achieve another goal. Our Conference, under the direction of Pastor Rick (Conference president) and Pastor David (youth director) are planning a mission trip to Madang, Papua New Guinea, next year, July 6 - 20. While the exact details are still quite fluid, they want a robust team of ages and experience to run a kids club, an evangelistic program and a practical project. The PNG Mission has forwarded an extensive list of how their program could be enhance by our contributions, and so they are looking forward in anticipation to July 2025, God-willing.

The costs involved in getting each person there (around \$2300), are our personal responsibility, but I am seeking

your financial assistance in purchasing the materials that will be used in the practical project. I know that our primary school on the Mission compound could do with a complete renovation as well as needing student/teacher resources, but shortly we will know exactly what the project is and I have a 'man on the ground' there who will put a 'shopping list' together and price it for us, so that materials are there for when we arrive.

To summarise my request, we need:

- Money to purchase building materials in Madang,
- Student and teacher resources (maybe also money to purchase items there if more economical),
- People to indicate their willingness to go so a good mix of trades, abilities, ages (youth and more experienced) develop into a workable team.
- Good clothing to complement what the nationals already have (Op shop goodies are ideal/economical) etc.

The Conference treasurer is adding another subheading on the e-Giving app called 'Madang July Project', so whatever way that you do it, we would welcome / praise the Lord for your financial contribution to make this mission trip memorable for all concerned.

Free Community Winter Soup Kitchen

During the months of July to September, the Launceston Adventist Church ran a winter soup kitchen for the community around Mowbray in Launceston.

There were between 12 and 25 people attending each night, and some good community connections were made.

One particularly significant story was when a man was noticed coming out of Coles with just a loaf of bread and some spread to go on it. I asked him if he would like some free soup, and he was incredibly happy to be asked. I asked him if he had anyone at home who also needed some soup and he said, "yes my wife." When I offered for him to have soup and take some home to his wife, he said: "Oh that will be so nice. At least we will have something warm to eat tonight!" It broke my heart to think that this quiet, unassuming gentleman and his wife would have just had that bread for dinner, if we had not been there for him.

This and many other stories, showed that there is real need in the community at present. What a privilege that we could help. We were assisted by the Uniting Church in Launceston, who allowed us to use their hall at no cost. Coles provided the breads and rolls, and our Launceston ladies provided the soups. One lady we also met who was new to the area, often brought bags of fruit to assist as well.

Month Of Prayer

During the "Week of Prayer" month in September, the Launceston Church held a "Month of Prayer." This was incredibly successful when we trialled it last year, where several families around the city of Launceston opened their homes once a week for the month of September, to read the Week of Prayer readings. Last year we had about 30 members involved, while this year we had around 35-40 involved. It was a wonderful time of fellowship in each home, and some good testimonies were shared at a special worship service at the end of the month.



Faith FM Community Dinner

Launceston recently hosted a Faith FM community dinner. This dinner was held to promote the local Christian radio station, introduce Pastor David Maxwell as the local presenter, and to share a special program from "The Faith Experiment" presenter, Pastor Robbie Berghan on "Digital Currencies, Cashless Societies & Bible Prophecy."




The program was well attended by about 50 people, many from the community, or members who brought friends. There were many positive comments from those who attended, who were surprised with what Robbie shared about the

New Norfolk Church Children

At the start of this year, New Norfolk Church did not have any children's Sabbath Schools. We prayed that we would be able to start one and, through it, reach children in the local community for Jesus. Shortly after we began, God started bringing families from the local community. Praise the Lord that we now have six families regularly attending the children's Sabbath School class.





At the end of this past quarter, the children shared with the church what they have been learning on the theme "I Am a Christian." They sang the songs they had learned, interspersed with Bible verses about being a Christian that they had memorized. Despite two families having to pull out at the last minute due to illness, everyone seemed to love it, and there have been requests for the children to share again soon.

New Norfolk Church Cooking Class

During July and August, New Norfolk Church ran healthy, plant-based cooking classes over eight weeks. These classes were accompanied by short health talks covering each of the 8 'Laws of Health.' We blanketed the township of New Norfolk with flyers in people's letterboxes and utilized social media community pages to promote the event. Soon, the local newspaper contacted us and wrote a story that spread the word even further.

Twenty-seven people from the community ended up attending (20 adults and 7 children) along with several volunteers from our local church and abroad. The feedback was very positive, and most attendees requested further cooking classes and health programs. Consequently, we have launched a monthly health club to maintain interest.

The best part of all is that one man who attended the first cooking class, initially opposed to God and church, continued coming to every single class and is now having in regular, personal Bible studies. Another lady from the cooking classes showed up at church last Sabbath. It is great to see how, just as in Jesus' day, ministering to people's physical needs leads to the opportunity to minister to their spiritual needs. We have truly seen that health work is the right arm of our message.



The Tasmanian Conference held its 59th constituency meeting on September 22 at the Hotel Grand Chancellor in Launceston, where 130 delegates gathered to elect the leadership team for the next four years.

Pastor Rick Hergenhan, who has been serving as Tasmanian Conference president since 2022, was re-elected as president, and Pastor Mark Falconer was reappointed as general secretary. They will serve alongside Kelvin Wood, the returning chief financial officer.

In addition to the leadership appointments, delegates voted on several key items, including the election of the Executive Committee. Delegates also approved changes to the constitution.

According to Pastor Terry Johnson, Australian Union Conference President.

"The tone and atmosphere were sweet, and the delegates engaged in the processes as outlined in their constitution. It was good to see the incumbents re-appointed with significant support giving it stability as well. The AUC is praying for the church in Tassie as it starts working on increasing the presence of the Lord in a state where 50 percent of the population claims to have no spiritual belief and the hostility towards Christianity is rampant."
