



The JETS Shed was the place to be at Big Camp. An average of 50 kids, aged 10 to 15, walked through the doors each day, engaging in Bible studies, crafts, sharing good news, and enjoying fun afternoon activities. On the two Sabbath mornings, nearly 70 kids were in attendance. Pastor Jeff Parker, AUC Youth Director, was the speaker. The theme for the week focused on mirroring the Kingdom of God in our communities. On the final Friday night, 30 kids expressed their desire to be baptized and/or participate in Bible studies with friends. A heartfelt thank you to the incredible team of volunteers who supported these kids throughout the week.

Every morning in the Primary Shed, the children began with a countdown to liftoff. Once we rocketed off, we sang songs, learned space facts, and embarked on an exciting journey with our fluffy puppet friend, Astronaut Cosmo. Each day, Pastor Daron Pratt showcased his incredible balloon skills while sharing messages about Jesus' great plan to save us. This was followed by a fun craft session. But the excitement didn't end there. The afternoons were filled with thrilling excursions, including pedal buggies, a waterslide, and a visit to the Planetarium. Here, friendships blossomed, and beautiful memories were created. To conclude the week. the children visited a retirement home, sharing the love of Jesus with the residents by singing, reciting memory verses, and gifting balloons.





The Kindy division was an underwater world of discovery for our youngest Big Campers learning about God's deep love for us. The morning playful worship with music and movement explored stories of the sea in the Bible, like Jonah and the big fish. Afternoon Playgroup offered delightful sensory, water and messy play. Kids and parents alike were fascinated with the seahorses that visited from the Creation Discovery Centre.





On Sunday morning, the Big Camp Fun Run brought together around 40 enthusiastic participants,

both adults and children. Beginning at 7 a.m., runners had the option of three courses—1km, 2km, or 5km. The youngest runner, four-year-old Hannah, completed the 1km course, while the oldest participant was in their late fifties. Those who finished first and second in the 5km race impressed with their speed, while others enjoyed a leisurely run, jog, or brisk walk at their own pace. Winners from each category were awarded Sanitarium merchandise.

After the completion of the Fun Run, Sanitarium generously sponsored a free breakfast. Attendees enjoyed cereals, Up & Go, vegetarian sausages, and a variety of plant-based milk options. A big thank you to Sanitarium for their ongoing support of our Church's mission.

Later that day, Pastor David Leo organised a fun-filled **Family Fun Day**. Everyone enjoyed classic games like tug-of-war and relays, creating wonderful memories for both children and adults. It was a fantastic opportunity to learn about these ministries and their work.

One of the special musical highlights at Camp was a performance by **The Commissioners**, an Adventist men's singing group from Victoria. Made up of men from Vanuatu, their powerful and professional performances inspired and uplifted the audience.

During the camp, Toa Kofeloa and Pauline Stanton set up a pop-up hairdressing and barber service, providing haircuts for what felt like almost everyone at Big Camp! Through their efforts, they raised over two thousand dollars to support a mission trip to Papua New Guinea in July. We truly appreciate their dedication and generosity.





One of the unexpected highlights of Big Camp was the chicken hatching experience. Two incubators, set up in the camp office, held over thirty eggs, and campers were delighted to watch as baby chicks hatched during the event. It was a popular and fascinating sight for all ages.

On the final Sabbath of Big Camp, the mission offering collected, raising nearly \$4,000 to support Fulton College in Fiji. This generous contribution will help further the college's mission and educational initiatives, making a positive impact in the lives of many students. Thank you to all who gave so generously.

A popular spot at Big Camp was the Gathering Cafe, which served hot drinks and sweets. Many campers appreciated this warm and welcoming space, where they could relax, enjoy a treat, and connect with others. The cafe provided a wonderful opportunity for building relationships and fostering a sense of community.

TASYOUTH: FAITH IN ACTION AT BIG CAMP



Anytime is a good time to make a Will and ensure your family's future is secure.

Have you ever considered what might happen should you pass away without having made a Will? Given more than 52% of Australians over 18 (according to a 2024 finder.com.au survey) don't currently have a Will the realities of such a scenario are all too common. The term 'Intestate' can be defined as "when a person dies without a valid Will, or has a Will which does not distribute the estate in its entirety."

In this scenario there is legislation that deals with the distribution of your Estate which may or may not be in line with your values, beliefs or desires.

A common misconception in this regard is that if you die without a Will then the 'government will get all of your stuff.' Whilst this is a potential outcome, the laws of intestacy would only allow this if you had no living relative.

Regardless, the importance of having a Will cannot be understated and the ministry of the Trust Services Department assists church members (and those otherwise associated with the Seventh-day Adventist Church) in this Endeavor.

Throughout 2024 Trust Services has been working not only to produce Wills for our clients but also ensuring that the records we do hold are as accurate and up to date as possible. This is no easy feat and requires countless hours of work both with clients, their families and our supervising Solicitor. To assist with the delivery of this ministry in as timely a manner as possible, and to extend it more readily to our members in Tasmania implemented an online booking system for those able to attend an online appointment. Additionally, in consultation with the Administrative team of the Tasmanian Conference, and after the success of our 2024 visit, two further visits to Tasmania are planned for 2025.

MISSION TRIP: THE GREAT ESCAPE FROM WINTER TO SUMMER

ello, my Tasmanian family! It's Stuart here, inviting more people to join the mission trip planned for July 6–22 to Madang, PNG. Planning is ongoing, but we are still waiting for additional details about accommodation. We trust in the One "who shall supply our needs according to His riches in glory." Our wantoks in Madang are excited about our visit, and I am confident they will provide what is needed.

I was pleased to share information about this trip at Big Camp, but if you missed it, let me reiterate what we hope to accomplish:

Evangelistic Program: We plan to conduct an evangelistic program at up to three sites over ten days, organised by Pastor David Cherry.

Kids' Club: A Kids' Club will run for several days in the first week, led by Pastor David Leo.

Construction Project: We will build a two-classroom structure on the existing primary school site at the Mission Headquarters, led by our CFO, Mr Kelvin Wood. Currently, four skilled builders have volunteered, but a couple more would be fantastic, as the building will be approximately 20m x 6m. We are also working to arrange local men to assist.

Fundraising Goal: We aim to raise \$20,000 to fund the project. Last year, you generously donated over \$16,000, which provided over 2,000 Bibles for Madang. I sincerely thank you for your generosity and pray that the same spirit of giving will continue this year. I am mindful of the saying about *flogging a*









willing horse, so I will keep a low profile once this project concludes.

Travel Costs: The estimated cost for transportation to and from Madang is around \$2,500 per person.

How to Get Involved: An Expression of Interest form is available on the Conference website for those considering joining the trip. Additionally, on the Church's E-Giving app, you will

find a "Madang Project" heading where you can make financial contributions to support our *Sister Mission* in Madang.

If you feel called to be at the coalface of mission work this July, please pray for guidance. If God is leading you to take part, complete the Expression of Interest form, which closes on March 17.

Over the past three weeks, about 20 young people have been part of the team, helping deliver hundreds of Christian books into people's homes, including *The Great Controversy, Steps to Christ*, and others.

Despite facing rejection, rudeness, and countless "not interested" responses,

divine appointments continue to come at just the right time! Many people have been invited to church, prayed with, encouraged, and even challenged to think about God. Some have even considered Bible studies with Pastor David Cherry.

We have been so blessed by the kind church members from Margate and Glenorchy churches, who have provided many delicious meals—something the team has deeply appreciated! Additionally, the team had the privilege of leading church services at both Margate and Glenorchy, sharing fresh testimonies and an uplifting message.

Please pray for our young team as we finish our final week of outreach. Also, keep in prayer the many precious individuals who have been touched over the last few weeks. God is raising up a beautiful army of young people spreading the Gospel of Jesus Christ, helping to finish the work in these last days—bringing hope and truth to hearts and homes while we still have time and opportunity!

We truly hope this Youth Rush program will be the beginning of many more here

in Tasmania and that more local young people will catch the vision and join in this vital work. Praise God!

New Norfolk Church 100 Year Anniversary & Baptism

On February 14, 1925, the New Norfolk Adventist Church building was dedicated with 50 people in attendance. On February 15, 2025, around 100 people gathered to celebrate the 100-year anniversary of the Church building.

Pastor Bruce Grosse extensively researched the history of this church in preparation for the anniversary. He then shared a fascinating and deeply inspiring account of the Seventh-day Adventist Church's presence in the Derwent Valley. From the dedicated efforts of the early pioneer workers to the self-sacrifice of the first members in securing land and constructing the church, the early history serves as an inspiration for our work for God today. The church's service to the local community, especially during times of flood and fire, is also worthy of emulation.

We enjoyed hearing about the work of Craig Brady's grandmother, who, alongside the minister's wife, helped distribute 1,400 articles of clothing to 500 people after the floods. It was also a joy to see a photo of Julee Rabe—the church's longest-attending member—as a little girl at the opening of the hall, built to accommodate the 36 children then attending the children's Sabbath School.

Henry Higgins shared an update on the church's current outreach in the New Norfolk community, followed by Pastor Rick Hergenhan delivering a sermon on God's purpose for His people—to be a blessing to those around them. He related how, just as Abraham and his literal descendants were called to bless others, so too is God's church today.







We then enjoyed a luncheon and a wonderful time of fellowship together.

The day before the anniversary program, the local newspaper featured our church on the front page under the heading "A Century of Saturdays." We praise God that many members of the local community attended, including former members who had drifted away but returned for this special occasion.

The highlight of the day was traveling up the Derwent River in the afternoon to witness Debra McArdle being buried with Christ in the waters of baptism, rising to live a life consecrated to Him and His service. Her testimony of how Jesus saved her and led her to our church was deeply moving. At the conclusion of the service, two members of the local community responded to the appeal for baptism.


Unlocking Student Potential

The newly established Student Wellbeing Framework is designed to create a safe, inclusive, and supportive environment where students can flourish. This initiative aims to:


- Promote a culture of safety, inclusion, and support within the school community.

THE ALLURING CULTURE OF LUKEWARM




Photo of the iceberg that the Titanic allegedly struck on April 14, 1912, were released in 2012 to mark the centenary of the disaster.

If you were the captain of an ocean liner and received warnings of icebergs, would you slow down? Of course—common sense, right? Not so for Edward J. Smith, the well-liked captain of the Titanic. Many blame him, but not so fast. While he was responsible, the culture of the time significantly influenced decision-making.

Following the disaster, the U.S. Senate inquiry concluded unequivocally that overconfidence, ignored warnings, poor communication, and a lack of leadership led to the Titanic's sinking. Theories about how the Titanic went down are as numerous as there are armchairs, but the cultural mindset of that era presents an intriguing thread to follow. According to the Senate inquiry, this prevailing culture fostered a sense of overconfidence that led the captain not to slow the Titanic as it moved through the ice fields, consult with his officers, or increase the number of lookouts. Strangely, not all seven iceberg warnings were even relayed to him. The confluence of these events played a significant role in one of the greatest and most famous maritime disasters of all

A far greater disaster, however, awaits those from the prophetic church of Laodicea who fail to heed the warnings in Revelation 3:14–21. In the ancient church, their culture—shaped by extravagant wealth—fostered self-confidence, self-

assurance, and self-sufficiency, fuelling their cravings for pleasure and leisure. As a result, when it came to spirituality, the local church members mistakenly believed, "I am okay; I need nothing." The parallels to our times are clear.

Prophetically, Laodicea represents the final church before the Second Coming. At that time, there will be no "lukewarm" Adventists—everyone will be either hot or cold. Why? Because, according to the letter, it is the "counsel of the True Witness" to the Laodiceans that eradicates lukewarmness. They were counselled to buy gold refined in fire, apply eye salve so they could see their true spiritual condition, and wear white garments to cover their nakedness. This counsel from Jesus is fairly standard, isn't it? Yet, while some become spiritually hot, the intriguing question is: why would Jesus' counsel cause so many Sabbathkeeping, believing Adventists to become cold? How can the message of Jesus be so divisive and controversial?

At the very heart of every false religion is the desire for people to save themselves (DA, p. 35). One reason many become cold is that something else has functionally taken the place of Jesus as their Savior. Innocuous phrases such as "I am okay," "I am a good person," or "I have all I need" are expressions of self-reliance apart from Jesus.

On the other hand, what drives people to become "hot" is best summarised by a story from Morris Venden. During a time of theological upheaval, he asked H.M.S. Richards, Sr., founder of the Voice of Prophecy, "What is the Adventist message?" Richards' razor-sharp reply cut through all the controversy with just two words: "Jesus only." Could it really be that simple? For the self-reliant and self-sufficient, it is too easy to construct an alternative system of salvation. The Sabbath-keepers in Jesus' time did just that. While Jesus opposes a system of works-based salvation, He is not opposed to effort.

Many Laodiceans will make a shipwreck of their faith because they do not realise they are poor, miserable, blind, and naked. Today, the message to the Laodiceans has lost its meaning for many. The challenge remains the same each day—not to prioritise the ding of a phone notification but to answer the knocking door. In relational terms, it means listening to His voice and breaking bread with Jesus (John 6:51; Revelation 3:20-21), who promises eternal life. Simple and easy—right? Not when culture powerfully conditions people to expect low spiritual outcomes. Maintaining a vibrant relationship with Jesus requires countercultural effort.
